# **Inspiring Christ-Centre Leaders**

Recently while reading some work by Elena Aguilar I came across her thoughts on the importance of The Arts in education.

- Art education brings communities together and offers a language that transcends race, language, age, and ability.
- The arts teach children that problems can have more than one solution, that there are many ways to see and interpret the world, and that the limits of language do not define the limits of our learning.
- Teaching anything through music helps the memory; music helps children in maths and language development. Music helps them manage their emotions.



The arts help children find other ways of expressing their thoughts and feelings beyond the traditional. The arts have their own curriculum, integrated into core subjects, and infused in a school, contribute to all aspects of learning. They make a place feel good. They bring beauty.

When I walk around the school and visit classrooms I am always so moved by the beauty of our children's art, the sound of their music, the joy in their poetry. Our children expressing themselves in these beautiful genres. I encourage all parents and guardians to visit your children's classrooms and view some of the lovely displays and artwork, they really are exceptional. Thank you to the staff who inspire such creativity in our children.

### **Catholic Schools of Excellence**

I am currently in the process of completing teacher appraisal through the use of 1 Growth Plans. A growth plan is a framework that you can create to guide the decisions that you make in life. It can be related to your job, but it can also be about your goals, aspirations, and self-improvement. If you want to be more strategic in achieving your life goals, having a growth plan can be beneficial. The staff are asked to reflect on their own performance and develop goals and a strategic direction to achieve the desired outcomes. They enable me the opportunity to support the staff in attaining their professional best. The conversations also allow me to provide the opportunity to assess teacher performance, provide feedback on pedagogy and develop our staff capacity. This ultimately leads to improved student gains, enhanced academic rigour in our classrooms and an explicit learning teaching agenda.

Research greatly supports, that one of the Key influences on student achievement at school is "their home life" and that school has only a small sway on practices found within the home life. Factors that can encourage success at school include e.g. bed times, quality of sleep, parenting habits and practices, relationships, discipline, quality time spent with children, diet, self-hygiene, environment cleanliness etc.

Nine Key elements have been identified for maximising whole school improvement and improved opportunities for student engagement and learning outcomes.

- 1. An explicit improvement agenda
- 2. Analysis and discussion of data
- 3. A culture that promotes learning
- 4. Targeted use of school resources
- 5. An expert teaching team
- 6. Systematic curriculum delivery
- 7. Differentiated teaching and learning
- 8. Effective pedagogical practices
- 9. School/Community partnerships

As Principal it is my challenge to work with staff, students and community within these nine areas to develop an explicit plan for improvement.

### **School Curriculum and Standards Authority**

The School Curriculum and Standards Authority is responsible for Kindergarten to Year 12 curriculum, assessment, standards and reporting for all Western Australian schools.

The School Curriculum and Standards Authority (the Authority) requires all schools to implement the Western Australian Curriculum and Assessment Outline (the Outline) which can be located at www.scsa.wa.edu.au to meet the learning needs of all students.

The Outline is informed by Belonging, Being and Becoming: The Early Years Learning Framework (EYLF) and the Australian Curriculum. The Outline includes Kindergarten Curriculum Guidelines, but these are not mandated because Kindergarten is a non-compulsory year of schooling.

The Outline sets out the mandated knowledge, understandings, skills, values and attitudes that Preprimary to Year 10 students are expected to acquire in the eight learning areas identified in the Alice Springs (Mparntwe) Education Declaration (2019), Principles of Learning, Teaching and Assessment, expected standards of achievement, and requirements for reporting on student achievement.

Schools are required to provide plain language reports to parents/carers at the end of each semester. The reports need to provide an accurate and objective assessment of the student's progress and achievement and include an assessment of the student's achievement in terms of the Western Australian achievement standards.

To meet the Pre-primary (PP) to Year 10 policy requirements, written reports should include: • report on achievement in all areas taught (PP minimum reporting requirements are Religious Education, English and Mathematics. • a teacher assessment of the student's attitude, behaviour and effort; • a description of the student's progress in personal and social learning (mandated for PP—Year 2; however, schools are encouraged to continue this up until Year 6); and • any additional information the school considers relevant, including an overall teacher comment.

The achievement standards describe the expected achievement for students who have been taught the curriculum content for the full year of schooling. Therefore, for the Semester 1/Mid-Year reports, teachers make a professional judgement in relation to the year level Achievement Standard to that point in time. The Semester Two (End of Year report) must reflect achievement of the year long Achievement Standards in each learning area/subject.

Religious Education: Reporting in Religious Education requires that each student from PP to Year 10 be graded against a five-point scale, as per other learning areas. Five Point Scale: • In the PP year, schools must report using achievement descriptors but without letter grades. The achievement descriptors must align with the achievement descriptors described in the Pre-Primary to Year 10: Teaching, Assessing and Reporting Policy. • In Years 1 and 2, schools must report using letter grades (A-E) or achievement descriptors. • In Years 3 to 10, schools must report using letter grades (A-E).

These policies are mandated by the governing body for Schools "The School Curriculum and Standards Authority" and ratified under the *School Education Act 1999* and subsequent updates to this Act, including but not linted to the following Legislation and other regulatory frameworks: Australian Education Act 2013 (Cth), Australian Education Regulation 2013 (section 59) (Cth), Disability Discrimination Act 1992 (Cth), Disability Standards for Education 2005, Equal Opportunity Act 1984 (WA), National Education Agreement Public Sector Management Act 1994 (WA), School Curriculum and Standards Authority Act 1997 (WA), School Education Act 1999 (WA), School Education Act Employees' (Teachers and Administrators) General Agreement 2014.

### **Catholic Pastoral Communities**

Congratulations on the boys and girls who received the Sacrament of Confirmation last week. It was a lovely celebration and Bishop Emeritus Justine Bianchini's homily to the children was very profound and empowering. I wish all the boys and girls and their families God's blessing on receiving this special Sacrament.

Every Catholic School must have an Evangelisation Plan. The Evangelisation Plan addresses three areas: staff, students and community. The Evangelisation process contains a number of essential elements. They are:

- The Christian Vision of the Human Person
- Christian Witness
- Primary Proclamation
- Catechesis

These four essential elements of Evangelisation start in the family and Parish and find expression in the Catholic school. The Evangelisation Plan offers experiences in a Catholic school for building and nurturing of faith in our community.

What is Evangelisation? To evangelise is to be willing to share the good news about God with others. The Holy Father explained that Evangelism is "to serve men and women by revealing to them the love of God made manifest in Jesus Christ" (Mission of the Redeemer 42). Evangelisation is about taking the risk to care for all people, inviting them to share in a Christian community in which they come to know God more fully, and in which they form a deeper relationship with God, so God becomes central in their lives. Evangelisation is an activity of faith, built upon the power of the Message. It achieves its purpose gradually for people need to accept the Message for it to have its full effect.

Evangelisation takes place through: Witness-being a Christ-like presence giving Christ like love in actions and words (Mandate Letter, p.10) ° Ministry of the Word-which uses words to proclaim the Good News in the same way as Jesus did (Mandate Letter, p.10)

The General Directory for Catechesis provides an understanding of different ways or processes that should be used in the evangelisation process, according to the different faith stages of those to be evangelised. Given that our mandate is evangelising within Catholic schools it is appropriate that we consider the faith context that our children occupy, that is if we are called to evangelise the students at St Lawrence, we need to be aware of their needs in order to determine the appropriate responses to those needs.


## Accessible, Affordable and Sustainable

On 5 December 2008, State, Territory and Commonwealth Ministers of Education combined in a meeting as the Ministerial Council on Education, Employment, Training and Youth Affairs. They released the Melbourne Declaration on Educational Goals for Young Australians.

An extraction from the Melbourne Declaration on Educational Goals for Young Australians:

"Rapid and continuing advances in Information and Communication Technologies (ICT) are changing the ways people share, use, develop and process information and technology. In this digital age, young people need to be highly skilled in the use of ICT. While schools already employ these technologies in learning, there is a need to increase their effectiveness significantly over the next decade."

Successful learners have the essential skills in literacy and numeracy and are creative and productive users of technology, especially ICT, as a foundation for success in all learning areas. The Melbourne Declaration is clear on the use of ICT in schools and how we must move to embed the use of ICT in all learning arrears.


### **SAFE SNEEZING**
