Last Supper – Passover

Now on the first day of Unleavened Bread, when they killed the Passover Lamb, His disciples said to Him, "Where do You want us to go and prepare, that You may eat the Passover?"

And He sent out two of His disciples and said to them, "Go into the city, and a man will meet you carrying a pitcher of water; follow him."



Wherever he goes in, say to the master of the house, The Teacher says, "Where is the guest room in which I may eat the Passover with My disciples?" "Then he will show you a large upper room, furnished and prepared; there make ready for us."

So His disciples went out, and came into the city, and found it just as He had said to them; and they prepared the Passover.

In the evening, He came with the twelve. Now as they sat and ate, Jesus said, "Assuredly, I say to you, one of you who eats with Me will betray Me." And they began to be sorrowful, and to say to Him one by one, "Is it I?" And another said, "Is it I?" He answered and said to them, "It is one of the twelve, who dips with Me in the dish. The Son of Man indeed goes just as it is written of Him, but woe to that man by whom the Son of Man is betrayed! It would have been good for that man if he had never been born."

And as they were eating, Jesus took bread, blessed and broke it, and gave it to them and said, "Take, eat; this is My body." Inspiring Christ-Centre Leaders

In these challenging times, I am well aware of the difficulties facing us all. Each one of us, children, parents, carers, staff are facing a barrage of challenges. Having said that it never ceases to amaze me how wonderfully resilient we are. Children adapting to new learning platforms and changes in their learning environments. Parents coming to terms with the difficulties teachers face on a day-to-day basis leading instruction and delivering curriculum. These unprecedented changes present as frustrating to many as you navigate these challenging circumstances. Our teachers have sent out a wealth of information to support the remote learning requirements. I strongly encourage you all to ensure you read the teachers' detailed support documentation. Many of the questions and requests from parents being sent to teachers have already been explained in the support materials. I have read a number of the emails some parents have sent to teachers and although I sympathise with the frustrations, there is no excuse for abusive, aggressive and disrespectful correspondence. Teachers are doing their best in these difficult circumstances. They are responding to up to 30 children remotely along with up to 30 parents, whilst maintaining their curriculum planning and general online support. It is impossible for them to act beyond their physical capacities. They are doing their best, which is extremely commendable.

Please be patient, reread all their instructions and support materials. Know you can only complete what you can. Provide sufficient break times for the children; help relieve their boredom and frustrations. When it is all getting too much. Stop. Do something else, as noted before in previous correspondence, teach your children something you wished you had learned when a child...how to cook a lasagne, how to count in another language, plant winter bulbs or herbs, to iron. It is important to stay calm, do what you can, do not worry if some activities were not completed and read all the notes from the teachers.

Hard times I know, we are all in this together and should all be rowing the same boat in the same direction.

Please be advised that students can wear both the summer or winter uniform when returning to school in Term II.
