Catholic Pastoral Communities





Learning at Home Tips

I have worked as a Primary Teacher, Assistant Principal and Principal since the late 1980s. With this amount of experience I have gained a wealth of knowledge in schools and education pedagogical practice. One thing I can personally attest to is the difference that can be made to a child's learning through parental support and involvement. This is further supported by a wealth of research data to substantiate the importance and benefits of parents being involved, and not just involved but involved in a positive, constructive and affirming way.

Given that children spend as much as 75% of their time at home, those children whose parents support their learning tend to be more motivated, engaged and enthusiastic in school, and are more likely to achieve their full potential.

Here are two observations and information I have sourced from elsewhere that may be beneficial to you all.

Bedtime

Establish a good bedtime routine to ensure your child gets enough sleep and you will instantly assist them in school.

A well-rested child will find it easier to concentrate, will be less likely to pick up infections and will generally have more positive relationships with friends - all things that are conducive to good learning.

Bedtime is also a wonderful time to share a love of reading and books. If you are enthusiastic and positive about books, it is more likely rub off on your child.

Healthy Diet

There's no doubt that maintaining a healthy diet can be a challenge, but by setting a good example and encouraging children to eat a nutritious diet, rich in fruit and vegetables and low in fat and sugar, you will not only be educating your child in healthy eating, but also helping to ensure they are able to concentrate fully in school.

We are still waiting to find out to what extent restrictions on public gatherings will be lifted here in Western Australia; coupled with advice from the Archbishop's office and Catholic Education Office WA. SEMESTER ONE REPORTS

School systems and sectors across the country have been offered flexibility in relation to reporting for Semester One 2020. The reporting and requirements for reporting for Pre-Primary to Year 10, due to COVID-19 and the disruption to learning and teaching, have been amended. On 7 April 2020, the Education Council agreed that, 'student progress will continue to be monitored and assessed by teachers with progress reports provided to parents and carers noting that existing assessment and reporting processes may have to be adjusted to accommodate broader changes to the teaching and learning environment.'

In reporting in Semester One, schools are required to provide to parents:

1. Information which gives an accurate and objective assessment of the student's progress and achievement, report on the curriculum taught and for which teachers can make a fair and reasonable professional judgement regarding student progress. Schools are not required to report student achievement using the A, B, C, D and E scale.
2. Schools should include some information regarding affective domains such as attitude and behaviour. In giving feedback to parents, teachers have an opportunity to acknowledge the way in which students have coped with the challenges presented by the disruptions of COVID-19.
3. Religious Education, English and Mathematics learning areas will be reported on using the three-point student progress scale: **Above Expected Level, At Expected Level, Working Towards Expected Level.**
4. General Behaviours will be reported on using a four-point scale: **Consistently, Frequently, Occasionally and Rarely.** There will also be a general comment at the end of the report.

A hard copy of the Semester 1 report will be sent home with each child in a sealed envelope on Thursday 2 July.

It has been a busy few weeks in Year Four. We have just finished our Talk for Writing unit looking at procedures. We have been learning about conjunctions and how they are used in sentences. We learnt an acronym "FANBOYS" and created fans that helped us remember different conjunctions to use.

We will be starting our new unit next week. In Mathematics, we have been practicing our times tables. Last week we had a quiz on our 11 times tables. I am very impressed with all the students' results. I encourage students to continue practicing times tables at home using the link provided for homework. We are also looking at measuring the volume of 3D shapes. Last week, we got to create 3D boxes. We then measured them using 1cm cubes.



In Religion, we have started learning about the Eucharist. We are still unsure of when the ceremony will take place. We hope it will be sometime this year.
