Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary

The Feast of the Annunciation, also called Annunciation of the Blessed Virgin Mary or Annunciation of the Lord, is the annuncement by the angel Gabriel to the Virgin Mary that she would conceive a son by the power of the Holy Spirit to be called Jesus (Luke 1:26–38). The angel's pronouncement is met with Mary's willing consent ("Here am I, the servant of the Lord; let it be with me according to your word").

As we celebrate this great Feast in our Church may we all turn to Our Lady as loving children turn to their own mothers and give thanks for her steadfast love of us all and gratefulness for the protective mantle, she places over us all.

### **Inspiring Christ-Centre Leaders**

The importance of the early years is pivotal to setting the foundations for the rest of our lives. An interesting analogy for a teacher's role is that they are in the business of "Growing Brains" Research indicates a child enters school with 25% of the brain already developed. That leaves 75% left to develop. Teachers can only do so much to ensure a brain develops. They can provide provocation for learning and skill acquisition, they can instruct, create lines of inquiry, review knowledge, practice skills, scaffold knowledge, and enhance meta- cognition. BUT none of this will be successful in maximizing learning if the fundamentals are lacking. So what are the essentials fundamentals requirements for learning?

- Healthy Diet
- Regular Sleep and plenty of it
- Exercise
- Stimulating Environments
- Calmness and not stress.

Without these elements being present no amount of after school tutoring, catch up lessons, extra homework will make for significant improvements or long term gains. Furthermore, without these essentials no class teacher will be able to maximize student gains. These essentials for learning are generated in the home. It is imperative children eat well, have regular sleep patterns that provide optimal sleep time, children need to be active, home life should include reading and writing opportunities and parental role modeling of reading and writing. Finally, an environment that is calm, routine, safe and supporting. Not even the greatest of teachers can make significant inroads to students learning and gains, without these elements being firstly present.

- Enable staff to participate in Faith Development opportunities

- Ensuring the inclusion of the school community when appropriate
- By striving to live and model good Christian Witness.

Both Ms Kathleen Tranquille and I attended the Parish Pastoral Council meeting and Father Emil is on our School Advisory Council. We are very blessed to have a wonderful and strong association with our Parish Church and community. Father Emil and Father Adam and their team are tireless workers who are always here to help and support our School. Father and I work closely to ensure that our school and Parish walk the journey together as one.

Prior to COVID the School Advisory Council and P&F were involved in a number of special joint meetings to look at initiatives and possible undertakings to continue building our wonderful school's community engagement.

PMIs were completed and the meeting facilitator pulled together the threads to come up with some target areas to help enhance our school. The Advisory Council has now, post-COVID, begun looking at this data and actions that can possible be put into motion to continue our journey of self-reflection, improvement and growth.

The P&F Meeting will be held on Thursday 24 March. We are blessed to have a small but dedicated team of community members who strive to build community and support the school by providing resources for our children and school. Mrs Adelle Cirillo is the President for 2021 and her committed Team have already been busy with our annual Easter Fundraising and were especially kind to support the school's response to the dreadful fires that wreaked destruction through a number of Perth's outer suburbs including The Vines, Ellenbrook, Gidgegannup, Upper Swan, Baskerville, Aveley, Henley Brook, Bullsbrook, Brigadoon and Wooroloo. The P&F donated monies targeted for, but not spent due to COVID restriction, from our Welcome Back Picnic. This combined with a donation from the Advisory Council and monies raised by students reflect our greater call to support others in times of need and our Lenten commitments to alms. 

### **HOME LEARNING**

Attendance of students at school is critical: Whilst I understand some absences can't be avoided, I urge all parents and caregivers to consider the following statistics.

If a student attends school 90% of the time, we regard them as attending regularly, but they will miss;

- 1 day a fortnight
- 1 week a term
- 4 weeks a year.

If a child attends 80% of the time, they are in the lowest risk category, but will miss;

- 1 day a week
- 2 weeks a term
- 8 weeks a year
- 1 year by the end of Year 4.

If a child attends 60% of the time, they are in the moderate risk category, but will miss;

- 2 days a week
- 4 weeks a term
- 16 weeks a year
- 1 year by the end of Semester 1, Year 3
- 2 years by the end of Year 5.

These school days missed cannot be regained.....the more time missed from school the more learning opportunities which are also missed, these may lead to gaps in learning, missing chuncks of information, knowledge and skills. The problem can continue to compound, and the gap may widen between students and achievement. This has the potential to become a downward cycle. Please ensure your children attend school regularly.
