Accessible, Affordable and Sustainable

Nationally Consistent Collection of Data

The Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on School Students with Disability (NCCD) takes place every year with all schools within Australia. The NCCD is a collection that counts:

- the number of school students receiving an adjustment or 'help' due to disability.
- the level of adjustment they are receiving to access education on the same basis as other students.

Students are counted in the NCCD if they receive ongoing adjustments at school due to disability. This 'help' allows them to access education on the same basis as a child without disability. The NCCD uses the definition of disability in the Disability Discrimination Act 1992. Schools provide this information to education authorities.

Student Background Data Collection

St Lawrence Primary School, along with other Catholic, Independent and Government schools, collects Student Background Data (SBD) on behalf of the Australian Curriculum and Reporting Authority (ACARA). Data collected is used for calculating the Index of Socio Educational Advantage (SEA) model that determines schools that qualify for special assistance. Collected student background data include the following: • The gender of your child; • The country of birth of your child; • Aboriginality, or other ethnicities; • Your occupation and educational qualifications (in very broad terms); and • The main languages/dialect spoken at home by parents/guardians and your child.

This information was provided when your child was first enrolled at St Lawrence. If there have been any changes to your situation or the data is not currently accurate, please complete the attached form and return to the school office by Friday 25 June 2021.

Collected information will be confidential and used for its intended purpose only. No individual person or school will be identifiable and linked with the results.



THE BISHOPS' RELIGOIUS LITERACY ASSESSMENT

At the request of the Western Australian Bishops, Year 3, Year 5 and Year 9 students in Catholic schools across Western Australia will take part in *The Bishops' Religious Literacy Assessment* (BRLA) from the week commencing Monday 2 August in Term Three. The assessment will be accessible to students online. Students enrolled in Year 3, Year 5 and Year 9 who are following a regular classroom program are expected to participate.

The BRLA provides a 'point in time' snapshot of student performance in RE. Students' knowledge and understanding of the content of the RE curriculum is assessed using a combination of multiple choice, short and extended response items. Students' faith is not assessed. The use of the BRLA complements the school-based assessment programs in RE.
