

Inspiring Christ-Centre Leaders

As you would all know as a school, we reviewed our **Vision for Learning**. One aspect of this review saw the introduction of our **Core Values**. School values can help pupils understand how to make good choices in life and they can also help to shape the mindsets and behaviour of future adults. So, their importance should not be underestimated.

As educational practitioners know, a large percentage of students' learning comes from watching behaviours of those around them. Children love to copy and act out being older than they are. Embedding school values in day-to-day life can help shape each child's understanding of the world. Character and values are an essential part of the hidden curriculum but also need to be explicitly taught. Everyday activities that focus on developing character and values will embed them as an underpinning part of boys' and girls' lives.

With a strong foundation, children will develop core values of their own. Schools play a significant part in preparing the future generation for their life as adults. This is a responsibility that we are very mindful of in Catholic Education. If a school's vision and values are clear and well thought out, our message will be simple and inherent. Gospel values and the teachings of Jesus Christ underpin all we do in a Catholic school. Our core values of Joy, Courage and Unity are rooted in our Catholic culture and Gospel values.

All of these can go a long way to developing our students' abilities to show initiative, contribute to others and gain respect and tolerance.

Joy, Courage and Unity, a simple acronym to remember our values is "Jesus Christ Units". This term our core value focus is **COURAGE.** You will notice our school banner has been displayed with our new focus, teachers will be working through this value with their children and the meaning of courage and how we can embed a courageous outlook in all our undertakings.

Catholic Schools of Excellence

The Profession Development focused on Creative Narratives on iPad for Primary Students, using Keynote, Pages, Clips, Tayasui Sketches and the School iPads, which are all installed with the latest iPad OS and Updates.

As we know, imagination is one of the most powerful forces on the planet, allowing us to envision, develop and bring to life our world. Staff worked to connect, collaborate, personalise and be creative with Storytelling in the Classroom on iPad. During the sessions staff worked on: Leverage iWorks – this enables users to see how to leverage multi-modal tools within Pages to empower students to become Creative Storytellers, using Photo, Video, Drawing and how to personalise learning. Staff also reviewed and focused on Accessibility Tools – to see how to implement inbuilt accessibility tools to enhance learning for all our learners. Curriculum Links were also reviewed and expanded upon by using a range of software including word processing programs to construct, edit and publish written text, and select, edit and place visual, print and audio elements within their creations.

On a personal note, I certainly learnt many new functionalities of an iPad that I certainly did not know beforehand.

Our staff work hard to be at the cutting edge of education, this allows us the abilities, skills, knowledge and expertise to support our children in their learning. To respond to the individual learners and offer different opportunities to support the different learning styles that present in a classroom full of our wonderful students. As principal I am extremely proud of our staff and the hard work they put into ensuring our students have the best opportunities to maximise their learning potential. I am also totally impressed by the learning gains of our students as they journey through their early education here at St Lawrence.

School Curriculum and Standards Authority

The School Curriculum and Standards Authority is responsible for Kindergarten to Year 12 curriculum, assessment, standards and reporting for all Western Australian schools

The School Curriculum and Standards Authority (the Authority) requires all schools to implement the **Western Australian Curriculum and Assessment Outline (the Outline)** which can be located at www.scsa.wa.edu.au to meet the learning needs of all students.

The Outline is informed by Belonging, Being and Becoming: The Early Years Learning Framework (EYLF) and the Australian Curriculum. The Outline includes Kindergarten Curriculum Guidelines, but these are not mandated because Kindergarten is a non-compulsory year of schooling.

The Outline sets out the mandated knowledge, understandings, skills, values and attitudes that Preprimary to Year 10 students are expected to acquire in the eight learning areas identified in the Alice Springs (Mparntwe) Education Declaration (2019), Principles of Learning, Teaching and Assessment, expected standards of achievement, and requirements for reporting on student achievement.

Schools are required to provide plain language reports to parents/carers at the end of each semester. The reports need to provide an accurate and objective assessment of the student's progress and achievement and include an assessment of the student's achievement in terms of the Western Australian achievement standards.

To meet the Pre-primary (PP) to Year 10 policy requirements, written reports should include: • report on achievement in all areas taught (PP minimum reporting requirements are Religious Education, English and Mathematics. • a teacher assessment of the student's attitude, behaviour and effort; • a description of the student's progress in personal and social learning (mandated for PP–Year 2; however, schools are encouraged to continue this up until Year 6); and • any additional information the school considers relevant, including an overall teacher comment. The achievement standards describe the expected achievement for students who have been taught the curriculum content for the full year of schooling. Therefore, for the Semester 1/Mid-Year reports, teachers make a professional judgement in relation to the year level Achievement Standard to that point in time. The Semester Two (End of Year report) must reflect achievement of the year long Achievement Standards in each learning area/subject.

Religious Education: Reporting in Religious Education requires that each student from PP to Year 10 be graded against a five-point scale, as per other learning areas. Five Point Scale: • In the PP year, schools must report using achievement descriptors but without letter grades. The achievement descriptors must align with the achievement descriptors described in the Pre-Primary to Year 10: Teaching, Assessing and Reporting Policy. • In Years 1 and 2, schools must report using letter grades (A-E) or achievement descriptors. • In Years 3 to 10, schools must report using letter grades (A-E).

These policies are mandated by the governing body for Schools "The School Curriculum and Standards Authority" and ratified under the *School Education Act 1999* and subsequent updates to this Act, including but not linted to the following Legislation and other regulatory frameworks: Australian Education Act 2013 (Cth), Australian Education Regulation 2013 (section 59) (Cth), Disability Discrimination Act 1992 (Cth), Disability Standards for Education 2005, Equal Opportunity Act 1984 (WA), National Education Agreement Public Sector Management Act 1994 (WA), School Curriculum and Standards Authority Act 1997 (WA), School Education Act 1999 (WA), School Education Act Employees' (Teachers and Administrators) General Agreement 2014.

Winter Uniform

A reminder that Term II and Term III require students to be wearing their winter uniforms. Please ensure correct uniform are worn. We offer a two week period of change over from the summer to winter uniform, should warmer days continue. High standards of presentation and grooming are expected at all times. I have noticed a number of students acquiring the tracks through their hair and the length of some of the "mullet" styles are getting too long. Please address these matters. Failure to comply with our school policies can impact your enrolment status at St Lawrence.

Thank you to all our families who always present correctly and adhere to our school's policies. Well-groomed children in their correct uniforms not only set the high standards that we expect here at St Lawrence but also help to build school pride, form unity and support children in their learning endeavours.

Catholic Pastoral Communities

As we move into the cooler seasons, we know coughs, colds and flus abound. It is imperative that children who are unwell remain at home. This reduces the infection rates to others and helps with the children's overall recovery. Unwell children simply cannot learn and must not be at school. As COVID is still as significant health risk factor please ensure you maintain thorough hygiene practices and test regularly.

We are currently finalising our Kindy and Pre-Kindy enrolments for 2024. We have very strong enrolment numbers and continue to be a school of high demand. WINTER UNIFORM

A reminder that it is an expectation that all students are wearing their full winter uniform this term. There is a two-week grace period, however the expectation is that all students need to be wearing the correct uniform by the start of Week Three.

Our uniform is a sign of our community. Hair must be neat and tidy and tied back if shoulder length or longer or if hair falls about the face. Hair should be checked regularly by families to prevent lice infestation. Hair styles should be of a conservative nature (no tracks, no hawks, no undercuts etc). Only natural hair colour permitted (no tints, streaks, tips etc). Minimal gel may only be used on the fringe, no other part of the hair.

Hair ribbons should be in school colours only: – blue or white with summer and winter uniform – gold, white, red with sport uniform. Jewellery: Plain small sleepers or small gold, silver or small stone studs, only one per ear in the ear lobe. One cross or Christian religious medal on a chain tucked under the shirt/blouse may be worn. No rings or bracelets to be worn.

Parents must be aware that watches may be worn at the owner's risk. Nail polish and make-up is not permitted. If an accident or problem prevents children from wearing their full uniform on any particular day, parents need to send a note of explanation. Hats are part of the uniform and need to be worn every day. "No hat, no play"

WINTER UNIFORM

Welcome back to Term 2. Students in Year 1 to Year 6 return in full winter uniform. Pre-primary students return in their Sports Uniform including track jackets and track pants.

Early Childhood students (Pre-kindy and Kindy) are encouraged to wear a Red Early Childhood T-Shirt and Red Early Childhood Track Top.

- Girls winter skirts should be worn at knee length and school white blouses worn over skirt (not tucked in) with school tie and white school socks
- Girls have option to wear navy tights with skirt (available at department stores).
- Hair ties navy or white with uniform and red or gold with sports uniform.
- Boys blue shirt tucked in school grey long trousers with school tie and grey school socks
- Boys and Girls wool jumpers to be worn with school uniform (Sport track jackets are not to be worn with school uniform) School wool vests are available for purchase and optional to wear.
