Inspiring Christ-Centre Leaders.

It was Aristotle who said, "Education is the best provision for old age." One of our aims here at St Lawrence is to help our students to become lifelong learners. The world is changing at ever faster speeds and the world we now live in will not be the world your children will grow up to work in. We must help our students to learn and adapt, to be able to cope with change and move with the environments that they will find themselves working in.

In many instances the jobs that your children will take on do not exist at present. So, we must endeavour to empower our students to be able to become lifelong learners and to be able to discern information, adapt, apply, evaluate, create, understand, recall, and analyse. To be able to make informed decisions based on facts. We strive to teach as much content knowledge as possible, but we also strive to ensure our students can locate, process, build, evaluate, infer, and re-define.

Bloom's taxonomy has been around since the 1950's but it is the classic classification of the skills and knowledge we embed in our pedagogical practices. Knowledge (finding out) Comprehension (understanding) Application (making use of knowledge) Analysis (taking apart the known) Synthesis (putting things together differently) Evaluation (judging outcomes). When I'm in classes, working with the teachers and most importantly the students, I see first-hand these essential skills and the knowledge at work.

Catholic Schools of Excellence.

Permission Slips and Excursions.

Section 23 of the School Education Act says that a student must participate in an educational programme of the school either at the school 'or elsewhere' as required by the principal.

Under the Act the consent/permission of a parent is not necessary for a principal to 'require' the educational programme to be delivered 'elsewhere' -i.e., via an excursion - any more than it is for the principal to ask parents to consent for the principal to deliver it at the school.

It would be misleading for a principal to ask for parents to consent to him/her delivering the educational programme as it implies that parents have that authority, which they do not.

Naturally, it is prudent for the principal to inform parents that their child will not be at the school and the reasons why. e.g. Attending an excursion. This would allow for exchange of any other relevant information that may be required.

Thus, permission forms for excursions following the educational programme are not required, as it is simply the extension of the education programme. The principal under the School Education Act is the person who deems where the education will take place, both on campus or off. Naturally, for larger activities e.g. Camps or even sleepovers, the principal may ask for permission as this extends beyond the School Education Act

Catholic Pastoral Communities.

Digital technology is a part of our lives. Whichever way we may look at it, devices are here to stay and will continue to evolve. We cannot hide from them, nor should we. Let's face it, when used correctly, the educational benefits of digital technology are obvious. In saying this, there are without doubt many risks when young people are given autonomy with a device such as an iPad.

'Digital Citizenship' in education is extremely topical and like all things with young people, parameters must be set to maintain safety and well-being.

I recently came across some literature attributed to Professor Donna Cross who is an expert in the field of social and emotional well-being in young people and the contribution that digital technology plays. She used the analogy that digital technology is very much like a swimming pool. Swimming pools are entertaining, and exciting, they encourage collaboration and are obviously loved by young people. On the flip side, they require direct supervision, structured learning, and boundaries to ensure they are used appropriately. When children use a swimming pool, strict parameters are generally in place, and for good reason.

It is the law to construct a fence around a swimming pool which prevents any unsupervised use and thus protects young people from harm. Generally, children learn from quite a young age how to appropriately use a swimming pool, this includes being taught to swim by a more experienced and competent adult. Warnings are in place about diving in the shallow end and first aid signs must be visible. Essentially, children are slowly introduced to the swimming pool, and their level of autonomy is gradually released.

Technology is no different. If we treat the use of technology with our children in a similar way to a swimming pool, we will be more likely to protect them from the negative aspects of the digital world, whilst exposing them to the positive power of the device. We have the capability to set our children up for success in the appropriate use of devices. The protection of the pool fence in this analogy may be seen as the protection that passwords provide and the level of independent access we provide

young people to certain technology and applications.

Overall, the key message here is to embrace technology for the educational opportunities it provides while at the same time, respecting and being aware of the enormous power they hold.

Accessible, Affordable and Sustainable.


