The vision of St Lawrence Catholic Primary School, Balcatta is to share the message of God's love and friendship in a community of learners, developing the full potential of each child.



We prayer for all the boys and girls who will be celebrating Confirmation this coming weekend.

The Roman Catholic Church views confirmation as a sacrament instituted by Jesus Christ. It confers the gifts of the Holy Spirit (wisdom, understanding, knowledge, counsel, fortitude, piety, and fear of the Lord) upon the recipient, who must be a baptized person at least seven years old.

A bishop normally performs the rite, which includes the laying on of hands and anointing the forehead with chrism (holy oil). Confirmation is a Christian rite by which admission to the church, established previously in baptism, is said to be confirmed (or strengthened and established in faith).

Our Confirmation falls on the Great Feast of Pentecost which is seen as the first confirmation and the birth of the Church. It must have been an overwhelming experience. It was just nine days after Christ ascended into heaven, and the apostles were still unsure of what to do. They had gathered in the upper room with Mary, the room where the Last Supper had happened. On the day of the Feast of Pentecost, one of the biggest Jewish High Holy Days, when Jews from across the ancient world would gather in Jerusalem, suddenly, in the Upper Room, the Holy Spirit descended on the Apostles as tongues of fire and they were filled with the Spirit of God.

I have taken the below statement from The West Australian (thewest.com.au)

McKinsey & Company acknowledged "compensation is a top driver for both attrition and retention" but was "likely to be insufficient" without increased investment in other forms of teacher support, including extra specialist and administration staff.

These reforms will take time and our teacher shortage crisis is now.

And that crisis has a direct impact on student outcomes.

As parents concerned about our children getting quality education, it is within our power to support our teachers and our schools. At the very least, we can take responsibility for not adding to the problem.

We need not just to be kind, but to demonstrate respect and gratitude for our teachers, their expertise and their capacity to make good decisions in the interests of our children.

We should consider the impact of our own behaviour, the behaviour of our children and the right of a teacher to feel safe and be treated with dignity at work. A teacher has a right to non-working time.

We should consider the broader context of a teacher already working overtime to educate our children and whether our request/demand is warranted, fair or constructive.

We should consider supporting school disciplinary strategies designed to deliver consequences for the disruptive behaviour of our children.

We should consider whether we would tell a pilot how to fly a plane, a surgeon how to conduct an operation or a CEO how to run her business.

Teachers are highly trained, well-educated professionals who are fast becoming an endangered species.

How we treat them matters.

There is currently a shortage of teachers and fewer graduates entering Teacher Training at universities. This is a worldwide phenomenon and one with potentially devastating consequences. An inability to attract people to the profession of teaching and to retain teachers has far reaching consequences. I am very aware of the demands placed upon our teachers, data collection, testing regimes, professional development requirements, long hours of preparation and marking. This is compounded by the large amount of paperwork and compliance obligations that are required.

I read in last week's newspaper that a teacher is attacked every 40 minutes somewhere across our state. Not a headline that would be attractive to a young person considering teaching as their vocation.

When I reflect on my 30 plus years in education, I can certainly see the changes in the landscape of education, and unfortunately not all for the better. I must however say, when I look at our community of St Lawrence, I see the positive relationships between school, home, and families.

All research indicates the more positive the relationship between these factors the better the outcome for our students. It strengthens my believe in our community when I hear our staff talk about the children with care, respect and a genuine desire to see the children thrive, when parents stop me and thank me for all we do. When children leave school smiling and happy, having learnt new and wonderful marvels.

I am encouraged and motivated by what I see here at St Lawrence. By and large our school and families working together for the best outcomes of our children. Positive relationships, enhancing the learning opportunities of our children. This aside, I see the demands placed upon our teachers, I see their cars here at 6:00pm at night and back at 7:00am in the morning. I see them here on the weekend, away from their families preparing lessons, marking, and spending time interrogating data to implement learning opportunities designed to cater for the many different individuals in their classes.

I know firsthand how much a teacher appreciates the support of a family, we know that as part of our professional standing we must feedback information to parents that you may find upsetting and concerning, we know children will make poor choices, we know we must respond to disruptive behaviour and ensure the learning environment remains stable and that these environments are safe. We value and appreciate when we have the support of families in responding to all these nuances of the vocation of teaching. Working together and walking in the same direction is the key to success.

I share this reflection with you not to lament over the state of education in general, but to share my thoughts. Our St Lawrence Primary School is a beautiful school, our children are truly gifts from God, yes, we all make poor choices from time to time, but this is part of the learning and growing process. My prayer is simple, we as a school community continue to walk in the same direction, embracing the blessings of family life and the life of the school, the aims of education and the ideals and values we strive to help our boys and girls come to embrace.

Respectful, open dialogue, good communication and mutual support and understanding are key to a thriving school. The outcome of a thriving school, the best possible opportunities for children to learn, and dare I say.....have some fun! To the staff, parents, community, and our boys and girls, thank you for the support, joy and commitment you all bring to our community. Not every day will be perfect, not every conversation to our liking, not every decision pleasing everyone. However, with respect, consideration and an open mind to try and understand, we stand on firm ground. I leave you with some words from Hebrews 10:24-25

And let us consider how we may spur one another on toward love and good deeds, not giving up meeting together, as some are in the habit of doing, but encouraging one another—and all the more as you see the Day approaching.



WELLNESS WEEK

Next week is Wellness Week. The following Holy Scripture quotes remind us all of the importance of rest, sabbatical, fallow times. These where importance concepts of Biblical times and Jesus himself was very aware of the importance of rest, time to rejuvenate, renew, and revitalize.

"Come to me, all you who are weary and burdened, and I will give you rest. Take my yoke upon you and learn from me, for I am gentle and humble in heart, and you will find rest for your souls. For my yoke is easy and my burden is light."

Leviticus 25:3-4

For six years you shall sow your field, and for six years you shall prune your vineyard and gather in its fruits, but in the seventh year there shall be a Sabbath of solemn rest for the land, a Sabbath to the Lord. You shall not sow your field or prune your vineyard.

Catholic Schools of Excellence

Schools are mandated to teach "Protective Behaviours" as part of the national curriculum. The Protective Behaviours Program teaches children, young people and adults a range of skills and strategies to help prevent and reduce child abuse and violence in our communities.

Whilst the task of preventing child abuse appears daunting for most parents, teachers and service providers, Protective Behaviours provides a framework that can be easily adapted to home, school and community environments.

Children who have been taught Protective Behaviours are more able to discern threats to their safety and are more likely to suggest using personal safety strategies than comparison children. (*Johnson*, 1985)

All Pre-Primary families who do not have an older child in the school and new families will be sent a 'Welcome Email' to register for a SEQTA Engage Account. Existing families with a current account should check that they can log in prior to Thursday 29 June. If you are unable to log in, please follow the process below to create a new password. Please contact the school office if you have any concerns or queries.

- 1. Click on the "Forgot your password? Link
- 2. Enter your email address into the relevant box and click on "Reset my password"
- 3. Go to your email inbox and reset your password according to the instructions in the email.

Please be aware that the password will expire after one hour of being generated.



Every year, all schools in Australia participate in the Nationally Consistent Collection of Data (NCCD). The NCCD process requires schools to identify information already available in the school about supports provided to students. These relate to legislative requirements under the *Disability Discrimination Act 1992* and the Disability Standards for Education 2005, in line with the *NCCD guidelines* (2019).

This information assists schools to:


- formally recognise the supports and adjustments provided to students with disability in schools
- consider how they can strengthen the support of students with disability in schools
- develop shared practices so that they can review their learning programs in order to improve educational outcomes for students with disability.

The NCCD provides state and federal governments with the information they need to plan more broadly for the support of students with disability.

It will have no direct impact on your child and your child will not be involved in any testing process.

The school will provide data to the Australian Government in such a way that no individual student will be able to be identified – the privacy and confidentiality of all students is ensured. All information is protected by privacy laws that regulate the collection, storage and disclosure of personal information.

A small bundle of replacement envelopes are in the office for families who misplace their envelopes.


New Student
