**EASTER MESSAGE FROM:  
The Most Rev Timothy Costelloe SDB  
Archbishop of Perth**

According to the gospel of John, Jesus spoke the following words to his disciples on the night before he died:

*Do not let your hearts be troubled. Trust in God still and trust in me (John 14:1).*

These words were spoken in the context of the Last Supper. During that meal Jesus had taken bread, broken it and given it to his disciples, telling them to eat it because it was his body which would be given up for them. He had then taken a cup of wine and invited them to drink from it, telling them that it contained his blood which would be poured out for them and for many (Mark 14:22-25; Matt 26:26-29; Luke 22:19-20). In the context of the growing opposition to Jesus from some of the religious leaders of his time, the apostles would have understood from these words that a crisis was coming which would engulf not only Jesus but them as well. In telling them not to let their hearts be troubled Jesus was speaking into their fear, uncertainty and doubt.

Jesus says the same words to us this year when we, too, are facing uncertainty, and even fear, because of the ongoing crisis of the COVID-19 pandemic which, in spite of the great progress being made in relation to vaccinations, still continues to ravage many parts of the world and threatens to again come and disrupt our lives.

*Do not let your hearts be troubled, he says to us. Trust in God still and trust in me.*

It is not always easy to follow this advice given to us by Jesus. The challenges we face, not just because of the pandemic but because of the many other difficulties and problems that each of us faces in our personal, family and community lives, often overwhelm us. As is the case in so much of what we say about our Christian faith, our lived experience differs from the high ideals we profess. The reality for many of us, at least some of the time, is that we **are** afraid and we **are** uncertain. We can often feel as if God is not there or does not care.

This, in fact, is not the case. God is closer to us than we are to ourselves. The faith we seek and the peace which Jesus promises to give us are precious gifts, always on offer to us – but they are never forced upon us. It is good to remember that, in the context of telling his disciples not to have troubled hearts, Jesus goes on to remind them that he is the Way and the Truth and the Life (John 14:6). In saying this Jesus is suggesting that if we were to follow some other way rather than his we might well get lost – and, as most of us know from experience, when we get lost we easily become disoriented. We lose our bearings, wander around aimlessly and sometimes even begin to panic and despair. Keeping to his way, and returning to that way once we realise we have strayed, is our sure method for stilling our troubled hearts and receiving the Lord's gift of peace. Similarly, if we commit ourselves to some other truth rather than the truth which Jesus makes known to us about who he is, about who God is, and about who we are in relation to God, then we run the very real risk of building our lives on a mirage or, as Jesus would put it in the gospel, on shifting sands rather than on solid rock (Matt 7:24-27). If we have to spend our lives struggling to maintain our balance because our foundations are so shaky, then we will not have untroubled hearts or that deep peace which is the Lord's gift. And again, if we fail to unite ourselves with the Lord in such a way that our life is enriched and deepened by the presence of his life within us, the serenity and trust which enabled him to endure the opposition, the cruelty and the violence of those who were determined to destroy him, will evade us. Our hearts will remain troubled and they will not be at peace.

When Jesus rose from the dead and appeared to his disciples his first words to them were, "Peace be with you" (John 20:20). Because of their love for him and because of the time they had spent with him the disciples were able to receive his gift of peace and their lives were transformed. May this be your experience, too, as we celebrate the life, death and resurrection of Jesus this year.

## **Catholic Schools of Excellence**

Our staff have been very diligently working through a new and exciting mathematical teaching approach. Here at St Lawrence, we value the time we take to research and explore any new endeavours we might be thinking about embracing or introducing. Staff have been working with their classes through a series of lessons targeting a "Launch, Explore and Summaries" approach to mathematics. It is an opportunity for the teachers to firsthand try out a new approach, collect data to see how the approach was received and most importantly the outcomes for the student learning.

We gather in our PLC's, (Professional Learning Community) Meetings and all staff report back on their undertakings and findings. These are very powerful and though provoking discussions, they are data based and driven discussions. Data based decision making or data driven decision making refers to educator's ongoing process of collecting and analysing different types of data gathered on students and their learning. The data is processed and used to guide decisions towards improvement of the educational process.

Each staff member has an obligation to be part of this process and from these undertakings whole school decisions are made. The most effective schools showing outstanding gains in academic measures report that the wide and wise use of data has a positive effect on student achievement and progress.

Using data to inform decision making is an excellent tool to move educational organizations towards improvement and enhance education effectiveness. Data can be used to measure growth over time, programme evaluation along with identifying root causes of problems connected to education. Involving schoolteachers in data inquiry causes more collaborative work from staff. Data provides increasing communication and knowledge which has a positive flow-on across many aspects of a school.

When attending these meetings and watching and listening I am always so in awe of the quality of work being undertaken by our staff here at St Lawrence. Their commitment to self-reflection and growth is exceptional.

Teaching and learning is a cycle, we plan, we prepare, we teach, we assess and review and then plan again. In good schools it is an upward cycle of constant growth and improvement.

## HOME LEARNING - Reading at Home

Your child will face many challenges as they grow, whether it is starting school, joining a sporting team or going to their first sleepover. The ability to make decisions and solve problems develops as your child learns to cope with daily challenges. Young children are not expected to sort through every issue on their own, and it is likely that they will require lots of guidance from their family. The good news is encouraging your child to take part in problem solving will help them develop this skill over time.

The following steps are a useful guide to teaching your child about problem solving. Encourage your child to take part so that they can slowly learn to do it for themselves.

Remember, it is best to begin when your child is feeling calm and relaxed. Start with an issue where you know they are likely to experience some success. If your child is very anxious or angry, help them to calm down first (eg having some quiet time, taking some deep breaths) or leave problem solving for another day or another issue when you know your child is ready to participate.

- Identify the problem. (Try to break it down to the simplest form...what is the heart of the problem at hand).
- Find Solutions. (Look at a number of solutions or desired outcomes, each will have potential consequences as well).
- Try them out. (If possible or plausible try different solutions out).
- Check in...How did it go. (If the problem is at school...ask how they went, was there an outcome)

It is important to keep the experience positive. Problems, issues, disputes and the like are all part of life. If we master how to handle them our lives become much easier to manage.

And remember small children take time to learn how to problem solve, but it is a key skill later in life when we are adults.

## ANZAC DAY



Anzac Day is a national day of remembrance in [Australia](#) and [New Zealand](#) that commemorates all Australians and New Zealanders who served and died in all wars, conflicts, and peacekeeping operations and the contribution and suffering of all those who have served. This year ANZAC day falls on Sunday the 25th April.

On Friday 23rd April the Faith Leaders will lead the school in our ANZAC Prayer Service in the undercroft. Parents are welcome to attend as it is in an outside location.

## NAPLAN

A reminder that students in Years 3 and 5 will participate in the annual NAPLAN tests in reading, writing, language conventions (spelling, grammar and punctuation) and numeracy. NAPLAN online testing will take place next term between the 11 May and the 21 May. All of the tests for our Year 5 students and most of the Year 3 tests will be completed online. The only paper test will be the Year 3 writing test.

The NAPLAN assessments provide parents and schools with an understanding of how individual students are performing at the time of the tests. However, NAPLAN is only one aspect of a school's assessment and reporting process. It does not replace ongoing assessments made by teachers about student performance.

Our Year 3 and 5 teachers will ensure students are familiar with the types of questions asked in the tests and will provide the children with the appropriate support and guidance. ACARA (The Australian Curriculum and Standards Authority) who are responsible for NAPLAN do not recommend excessive preparation for NAPLAN.
